## UPPER ELEMENTARY LESSON PLAN

**Theme:** Meeting needs by sharing what we have with one another.

**Scripture:** Acts 4:32

**Memory Verse:** All the believers were one in heart and mind. - Acts 4:32

## The Children's Sermon

Christian stewardship is a big word, isn't it? But it's not too hard to understand. It means taking good care of everything God has given us and using it to help others. It's like if you have a toy that someone else would love to play with, you share it. Or if you have extra snacks and you see someone without, you offer some to them. That's being a good steward.

# Bible Memory Verse

#### All the believers were one in heart and mind. - Acts 4:32

You Will Need:

- -Construction paper
- -Scissors
- -Markers or crayons
- -Glue sticks

#### Get Ready:

- -Cut the construction paper into heart shapes, one for each child.
- -Set up a table with markers, crayons, scissors, and glue sticks.

#### Do This:

- 1. Give each child a heart-shaped piece of construction paper and ask them to write 'All the believers were one in heart and mind. Acts 4:32' on one side of the heart.
- 2. On the other side of the heart, have them draw or write ways they can unite with others in their community or church.
- 3. Once everyone is done, create a 'Unity Wall' by gluing all the hearts together on a larger poster or wall space, demonstrating how when we come together, we create something beautiful.

## Bible Interactive Experience

#### You'll Need:

- A large poster board and markers
- Play money or fake coins
- A collection of small items (toys, school supplies, etc.)
- A "Needs Board" a space on the wall or a large sheet of paper to post needs
- Sticky notes and pens

#### Get Ready:

- Write Acts 4:32 on the poster board and decorate it with markers. Place it where all students can see.
- Set up a "market" area where the small items are displayed with price tags in play money.
- Prepare the "Needs Board" by titling it and hanging it on the wall.
- Distribute an equal amount of play money to each student.

#### Do this:

- 1. \*\*Introduction to Sharing\*\*: Start by reading Acts 4:32 together and discuss the concept of sharing everything we have to meet others' needs. Highlight how the early Christians lived this verse in their community.
- 2. \*\*Identify Needs\*\*: Have each student think of something they need help with or could use (not necessarily material) and write it on a sticky note. Encourage them to think beyond toys or games, perhaps help with a subject in school, a chore at home, or a friend to play with. They should then stick their notes on the "Needs Board".
- 3. \*\*Market Activity\*\*: Students visit the market area. They can purchase items with their play money, but with a twist: they should buy items not for themselves, but considering what others might need or enjoy, based on the needs posted on the board.
- 4. \*\*Meeting Needs\*\*: After the market activity, each student presents what they bought and guesses who on the "Needs Board" could benefit from it. This encourages empathy and thoughtfulness.
- 5. \*\*Reflection and Sharing\*\*: In a circle, students share why they chose the items for their peers, and then distribute their purchases accordingly. Discuss how it felt to think about and act on someone else's needs instead of their own.
- 6. \*\*Real-Life Application\*\*: Challenge each student to do one act of sharing or kindness in the coming week based on the needs they heard about today. They can offer their time, share a snack, or help with a task. Encourage them to share their experiences the following week.

## Snack Activity: Sharing Loaves and Fishes

#### You'll Need:

- Sliced bread (whole grain for health!)
- Canned tuna or chicken (to represent the fish)
- Sliced cheese
- Cookie cutters in fish and loaf shapes
- Plates and napkins
- Toaster or oven (with adult supervision)

Get Ready: Read Acts 4:32 together and discuss what it means to share everything we have with one another. Talk about how the early Christians lived this out and how we can do the same.

#### Do this:

- 1. Use the cookie cutters to cut out fish and loaf shapes from the slices of bread. Each child should make at least two of each shape.
- 2. Open the cans of tuna or chicken and spread them on half of the bread shapes. Place a slice of cheese on top of the tuna/chicken and then cover with the other bread shape, creating a sandwich.
- 3. Toast the sandwiches in a toaster or oven until the cheese melts (make sure there's an adult to help with this part).
- 4. Once the sandwiches are ready, sit in a circle and have each child share one thing they are grateful for. Then, share the sandwiches among yourselves, emphasizing the act of sharing just as the early Christians shared everything they had.
- 5. Discuss how it felt to share and eat together, relating the experience back to Acts 4:32 and the importance of community and sharing in our lives.

## Game Activity: Sharing Stones

#### You'll Need:

- A bag of smooth stones (enough for each child to have one)
- Permanent markers
- A large basket or container

Get Ready: Place the basket in the center of the room and distribute the stones and markers to each child.

#### Do this:

- 1. Read Acts 4:32 together as a class, focusing on the theme of sharing everything they had. Discuss what this might look like in their lives.
- 2. Ask each child to think of something they can share or a way they can help others in their community. It could be a toy, time spent helping someone, or a kind gesture.
- 3. Have each child write or draw that thing on their stone with the markers. Once everyone is done, one by one, have them explain their stone to the group and place it in the basket.
- 4. After all the stones are collected, discuss how the basket of stones represents the community of believers in Acts 4:32, sharing everything they had. Conclude by praying together, asking God to help each child share generously like the early church.

# Craft Activity: Unity in Giving: Acts 4:32 Community Puzzle

### You'll Need:

- Large poster board or cardboard
- Markers or paint
- Scissors

Get Ready: Cut the poster board or cardboard into puzzle pieces, one for each child in the class.

#### Do this:

- 1. Read Acts 4:32 together as a class, discussing how the early believers shared everything they had. Emphasize the unity and generosity among them.
- 2. Give each child a puzzle piece. Ask them to write or draw something they can share with others to meet needs, inspired by the scripture. This could be a talent, time, kindness, or material things.
- 3. Once everyone is done, work together as a class to assemble the puzzle. As each piece is connected, let the child explain what they wrote or drew.
- 4. When the puzzle is complete, discuss how each unique contribution is essential for building a community that reflects the unity and generosity of the early believers. Display the completed puzzle in the classroom as a reminder of their commitment to share and meet each other's needs.

## Prayer Activity: Sharing Hearts

#### You'll Need:

- A large poster board
- Markers or colored pencils
- Sticky notes

Get Ready: Write Acts 4:32 at the top of the poster board and draw a large heart in the center.

Do this:

- 1. Begin with a discussion on Acts 4:32, focusing on the early believers sharing everything they had. Ask the children how they feel when they share and when others share with them.
- 2. Encourage each child to think of something they can share with others (it could be a toy, time, help, or even a smile) and write it on a sticky note. Then, have them stick their notes around the heart on the poster board.
- 3. Lead a prayer where each child asks God to help them share what they wrote on their sticky note with someone this week. Close the prayer by asking God to make their hearts generous like the believers in Acts 4:32.
