# What Do You Have There? PRESCHOOL LESSON PLAN

Theme: We need help.
Scripture: Ephesians 1:15-23
Memory Verse: I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened. - Ephesians 1:18

## The Children's Sermon

"Do you know what I have here?" I'm holding something very special. It's a book, but not just any book. This is the Bible, and it's like a love letter from God to us. It tells us how much He loves us and cares for us. It's also like an instruction manual. You know how when you get a new toy, it comes with a book that tells you how to use it? ### Bible Memory Verse

#### I pray that the eyes of your heart may be enlightened. -Ephesians 1:18

You Will Need:

-Construction paper (various colors)

-Glue sticks -Scissors -Markers or crayons -Stickers (optional)

Get Ready:

-Cut out large heart shapes from the construction paper ahead of time. -Set up a table with all the materials spread out for easy access.

Do This:

Give each child a large heart shape and explain that this represents their heart.
 Ask the children to decorate their heart with markers, crayons, and stickers. While

they work, talk to them about how our hearts can 'see' things differently when we know Jesus loves us.

3. Once everyone is done decorating, gather the children and have them hold up their hearts. Lead them in saying the memory verse together, emphasizing that just like their decorated hearts are unique and beautiful, God wants to make the 'eyes of our hearts' bright and full of His light.

### **Bible Interactive Experience**

You'll Need:

- A small flashlight

- Simple picture cards of people helping others (e.g., sharing toys, helping someone up, giving a hug)

- A box or container to hide the flashlight

Get Ready:

- Hide the flashlight in the box or container before the children arrive.

- Lay out the picture cards face up where all the children can see them.

#### Do this:

1. Gather the children around and tell them we're going on a treasure hunt to find something special that helps us see in the dark. Explain that just like we sometimes need help to see, we also need help to be kind and loving to others.

2. Lead the children in a fun search around the room to find the hidden flashlight. Celebrate when it's found.

3. Sit down with the flashlight and the picture cards. Turn on the flashlight and shine it on the picture cards one by one. As you highlight each card, briefly explain how the image shows people helping each other (e.g., "This card shows a friend helping another friend pick up toys. Helping is a way we can show love.").

4. Conclude by saying that just like the flashlight helps us see in the dark, asking for help from God, our families, and friends can help us be kind and loving to everyone. Encourage the children to think of one way they can help someone this week.

# Snack Activity: Helping Hands Fruit Salad

You'll Need:

- Various fruits (e.g., bananas, apples, grapes, berries)
- Plastic knives
- Large bowl

Get Ready: Wash all the fruits and place them on a large tray.

Do this:

1. Talk to the children about how we can help others and how God helps us, relating it to Ephesians 1:15-23, explaining that God's power is so great and He is always there to help us.

2. Show the children how to safely use the plastic knives to cut the fruits with the help of an adult. Explain that just like we are cutting the fruits to share, we can also share God's love and help with others.

3. Mix all the cut fruits in a large bowl and share the fruit salad among the children, reminding them that when we help each other, life is sweeter, just like the fruit salad.

# Game Activity: Helping Hands Hop

You'll Need:

- A large open space
- Colorful tape or chalk
- Pictures of hands (can be drawn or printed)

Get Ready: Use the tape or chalk to create a simple hopscotch grid on the floor or ground. At the start of each box in the hopscotch grid, place a picture of a hand.

Do this:

1. Explain to the children that just like in Ephesians 1:15-23, we learn about the power of helping and being there for one another. Tell them that each hand in the game represents helping someone.

2. Have the children line up at the start of the hopscotch grid. One at a time, they hop on one foot or walk from one box to the next, touching the hand pictures as they go, saying 'I can help!' with each touch.

3. At the end of the hopscotch grid, celebrate each child's willingness to help others by clapping or cheering. Discuss simple ways they can be helpful at home or with friends.

## Craft Activity: Helping Hands Prayer Craft

You'll Need:

- Construction paper (various colors)
- Markers or crayons
- Safety scissors

Get Ready: Trace each child's hand on a piece of construction paper and cut out the hand shapes ahead of time.

Do this:

1. Give each child a hand cutout and ask them to think of someone they want to pray for or someone who needs help.

2. Have them draw or write the name of the person on the hand cutout with markers or crayons.

3. Lead the children in a simple prayer, asking God to help the people they've thought of. Encourage them to place their hand cutout somewhere they will see it daily as a reminder to pray for that person.

# Prayer Activity: Helping Hands Prayer

You'll Need:

- Construction paper
- Child-safe scissors
- Markers or crayons

Get Ready: Before the activity, cut out hand shapes from the construction paper, enough for each child to have one.

#### Do this:

1. Give each child a paper hand and markers or crayons. Explain that the hand represents our own hands asking God for help and helping others.

2. Read a simplified version of Ephesians 1:15–23, focusing on how God's power is great and He can help us with anything. Explain that we can pray to God when we need help or when we want to help others.

3. Ask the children to think of one way they need help or can help someone else. Have them draw or write it on the paper hand. Then, gather the children in a circle, and let them share their prayer if they wish. Finish by saying a simple prayer together, asking God to help us and to use our hands to help others.
