

# Taking Care Of God's House

## PRESCHOOL LESSON PLAN

**Theme:** Taking care of God's house

**Scripture:** Haggai 2:9

**Memory Verse:** 'The glory of this present house will be greater than the glory of the former house,' says the Lord Almighty. -Haggai 2:9

## The Children's Sermon

Taking care of our homes is something we all do with our families. We clean up, fix things that break, and replace stuff when it gets old. We like our home to look nice, especially when friends come over. But did you know there's another very special house we should take care of? That's right, it's the House of God, or the church.

Just like our own homes, the House of God needs to be taken care of in two ways. First, we need to look after the building. We want it to be clean and welcoming for anyone who visits. That means we might help pick up things left on the floor, dust, or even help set up chairs. It's like when we tidy up our room before a friend comes over.

Second, we need to take care of the people in the House of God. Imagine if you went to a big party at a famous person's house. ## Bible Memory Verse

**'The glory of this present house will be greater than the glory of the former house,' says the Lord Almighty. -Haggai 2:9**

You Will Need:

- Construction paper (various colors)
- Glue sticks
- Stickers or glitter
- Scissors (for teacher use only)

Get Ready:

- Cut out shapes of houses from the construction paper before class.
- Set up a table with all the materials spread out for easy access.

Do This:

1. Give each child a paper house shape and explain that we are making God's house beautiful, just like in our memory verse.
2. Encourage the children to decorate their house shapes with stickers, glitter, and other materials to make them 'glorious'.
3. As they work, talk to them about how we can help take care of God's house by keeping it clean, being respectful when we are there, and helping out.

## Bible Interactive Experience

You'll Need:

- Large cardboard box (to represent God's house)
- Washable markers
- Various craft supplies (stickers, fabric scraps, etc.)
- Cleaning supplies (small brooms, cloths)

Get Ready:

- Set up the large cardboard box in an open area and decorate it slightly to look like a house.
- Prepare a small "mess" around the house with paper scraps and safe, non-toxic items that need to be "cleaned up."
- Place markers, craft supplies, and cleaning supplies in accessible containers near the house.

Do this:

1. Read a simplified version of Haggai 2:9 to the children, explaining that we're going to make God's house (the box) the most beautiful and well-cared-for place.
2. Encourage the children to decorate God's house with markers and craft supplies, fostering a discussion about how taking care of God's house shows respect and love for God.
3. After decorating, guide the children in "cleaning up" around God's house using the small brooms and cloths, reinforcing the idea that taking care of our surroundings is part of taking care of God's house.

## Snack Activity: Temple Treats

You'll Need:

- Graham crackers
- Cream cheese or peanut butter (allergy-friendly options can be used)
- Assorted fruits (blueberries, sliced strawberries, banana slices)

Get Ready: Spread a clean tablecloth on the table where the activity will take place.

Make sure each child has a small plate, a spreading knife (plastic knives work well for younger children), and a napkin.

Do this:

1. Explain that the temple in the Bible was God's house, and we should take care of it just like we take care of our churches today. Haggai 2:9 talks about the glory of this future house. We're going to build our own little edible temples to remind us of this.
2. Give each child a graham cracker to use as the base of their temple. They can spread cream cheese or peanut butter on the graham cracker as the 'glue'.
3. Let the children use the assorted fruits to decorate their temple. Blueberries can be stones, sliced strawberries can be roof tiles, and banana slices can be windows.

Encourage them to think about how each part of their temple can be beautiful and taken care of, just like God's house.

## Game Activity: Temple Builders

You'll Need:

- Blocks or Lego
- Pictures of temples or churches (for inspiration)
- A simple illustration of Haggai 2:9

Get Ready: Set up a small area on the floor with the blocks or Lego. Display the pictures of temples or churches around the play area for inspiration. Show the children the illustration of Haggai 2:9 and explain that just like people in the Bible built God's house, they too can build a house for God.

Do this:

1. Invite the children to use the blocks or Lego to build their version of God's house.

Encourage them to think about what makes a house special for God, like being a place where people can pray, learn about God, and be together.

2. As they build, talk to them about how taking care of God's house and making it beautiful is important, just like Haggai said in the Bible. Explain that God's house is not just the building but also the people in it who care and love each other.

3. After everyone has finished building, have a small 'show and tell' where each child can explain their creation. Finish by gathering the children to say a simple prayer together, thanking God for His house and asking for help to take care of it.

## Craft Activity: Building God's House

You'll Need:

- Construction paper (various colors)
- Glue sticks
- Stickers or markers

Get Ready: Cut the construction paper into shapes of bricks, roofs, doors, and windows.

Do this:

1. Explain to the children that just like we take care of our homes, we also need to take care of God's house, which can be our church, our bodies, and the world around us.
2. Give each child a piece of construction paper as their 'foundation'. Ask them to use the brick shapes to build a house on the foundation.
3. Once the house is built, they can decorate it with roof, door, and window shapes. Encourage them to use stickers or markers to add details like trees, flowers, or animals, showing how we can make God's house beautiful.

## Prayer Activity: Building God's House Together

You'll Need:

- Construction paper
- Crayons or markers
- Stickers (optional)

Get Ready: Cut the construction paper into brick shapes ahead of time.

Do this:

1. Read a simple version or summary of Haggai 2:9 to the children, explaining that God's house is a special place and we should help take care of it.
2. Tell the children they are going to help build God's house by decorating their own 'bricks' with crayons or stickers. Encourage them to think about what makes a place special to God, like love, kindness, and taking care of each other.
3. Once they have decorated their bricks, help them place their bricks in a line or stack them gently to 'build' a wall. As they do, encourage them to say a simple prayer like 'Help us take care of Your house, God.'
